# Neenah cross country a team approach

## Special training methods prove to be successful

NEENAH — Six conference championships.

Eight trips to the state meet, one of them resulting in a state title in 2001.

Neenah boys cross-country coach John Morgen certainly knows how to get results.

He was named state coach of the year in 2001, District Four coach of the year twice, Fox Valley Association coach of the year five times and The Post-Crescent All-Area Coach of the Year twice.

His secret? A unique style.

For the past nine years, Morgen has kicked off the cross country season by taking his team to Onaway Island in Waupaca County for team-

building.





"It's a great chance to take a large team and have them get to know each other," Morgen said. "After three or four days not only are the kids in better shape but they have gotten to know each other."

This year's Neenah squad is 79 Rockets strong—the largest in Morgen's 11-year tenure (When Morgen first took over

as Rockets coach, there were just 20 members of the boys cross country team). With such a large squad, the boundarybreaking and team-building activities come in quite handy.

"I think for one it gives team unity like you would not believe," Neenah senior Ross

Younger said. "It's the highlight of my season, except for the competitions themselves. It's just phenomenal."

"It brings us all closer," senior Mike Stiff added. "It helps us push to see where our limits are."

Morgen is more than just an

organizer and a motivator. When it comes to cross country, he is as much of a participant as he is a coach.

A major in the National Guard, Morgen is not afraid of a little running.

"It's nice to have a coach who can get in there," Younger said. "He's not just some overweight guy who says 'Go do this.' He's right there beside you."

Morgen also is not afraid of a little biking. During his free. time this summer, Morgen biked up the east coast, from Atlanta to Portland, Maine. The trip took him 16 days, though it paled in comparison to last summer's trek from Everett, Wash., to Yorktown, Va.

"I think it's just amazing for that guy to do that," Stiff said.

Morgen also took part in an Ironman in Florida. He competed in his first Ironman in Lake Placid in 2000 and has been trying to compete in every one held in North America.

"They keep adding them," Morgen said.

Neenah assistant coach Mike Jovanovich also is an avid Ironman participant. To the Rockets cross country athletes, their coaches' determination and dedication gives them extra motivation.

"I think it helps us out," Younger said. "It's someone to look up to. I think everyone on the team looks up to Coach Morgan and Coach M.J. It gives us a sense of pride.

"Lets' face it, these guys are getting old, but they're right there with us," Younger said. "That's definitely a very cool thing."


