PURSUERS OF FAME AND VICTORY

Faster times, higher jumps, and longer throws became of prime concern as the track season arrived. Working with abundant talent, Head Track Coach Carl and Assistant Coach Batterman put together a well-balanced track team of 36 boys that won four of their five regular season meets and sent several old records crashing to oblivion.

In the conference meet, Neenah finished second to Two Rivers by $\frac{1}{2}$ point, 59 to 58 $\frac{1}{2}$. Mowry Stilp set new school and conference records in the shot put and a new school record in the discus. In the sectional meet, Neenah finished fourth and six Rocket trackmen qualified for state by finishing first or second in their events.

At state, Mike Lintner turned in a sterling performance by taking first place in the 880 and setting a new state record. At season's end, Jerry Schaefer was elected captain by the letter-winners.

Cross country, one of the less glorious high school sports, showed itself an established sport this year as sixteen boys turned out for the team. Under Coach Albert, they trained long and hard to build up the endurance necessary for the grueling marathons. Facing an expanded schedule, the harriers started the season with a loss to Appleton, 19 to 42. The next meet Neenah took easily with 19 points to Kaukauna's 41 and Kimberly's 84. At the Shawano invitational, Neenah placed fifth in a field of nine. Meeting Kimberly next, the Rockets copped an easy 15 to 49 victory. At the Manitowoc invitational, Neenah again placed fifth in a field of nine. In the conference meet at Two Rivers, Neenah finished third out of six teams participating. Meeting the Lawrence College freshmen, the Rockets won 23 to 34. The harriers finished up the season at a sectional meet at Ripon, finishing eighth in a field of eleven.
